

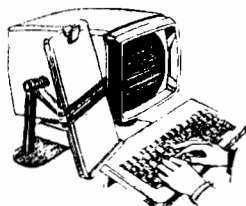

## President's Message

My greetings for Christmas and the New Year, to all Association members and their families. It had been hoped that many of us would have gathered in Darwin in April 2000 for a reunion visit to be held with 5/7 Battalion, however with the absence of 5/7 Battalion on duty in Timor, we felt it appropriate to cancel any official visit as 5/7 Battalion was not in a position to host our activities.

In lieu, and at short notice, a mini reunion was organised in Sydney over the Anzac Day period and this turned out to be a small, but pleasurable gathering which included a number of inter state members and notably, from West Australia.

The Association Committee has met several times in Sydney during the year and significantly, made a number of decisions at our meeting in August about which you should be aware, namely:

1. Increased support of our newsletter 'Tiger Tales', the main 'life blood' of the Association. 'Tiger Tales', which is published several times each year, is our primary means of keeping contact and hearing of and about each other. To this end, all of us need to make added effort to provide material to the editor, Brian London. I have written to every State Representative asking them to provide for each edition, information of activities and of members in their State. In particular we want to know of the sickness or death of members, of sub unit reunions, visits/trips and articles on service in Vietnam. State Representatives can only provide this information with your assistance, so keep in touch with your local Representative.
2. A copy of the 5th Battalion Association Constitution has been sent to each State Representative asking them to review the Constitution and advise me of any suggested amendments. State Representatives have been asked to obtain the views of as many local members as possible.
3. Reunions. Major, Battalion reunions should continue to be held, at nominated locations, every five years (next 2005), but in between Battalion reunions, local, Company/Platoon level reunions should be organised. We are aware of a number of such highly successful gatherings held this year.
4. Anzac Day reunions will continue to be organised on a State basis with post march gatherings at nominated 'watering holes'. The NSW Committee is currently considering a suitable 'post march' location to improve on some of the problems encountered this year.
5. Annual General Meeting. I intend to hold an AGM in Sydney next year (at a date depending on a likely trip to Korea that I may have to make for war commemorations). To consider member's views on the above matters (i.e. the Constitution, reunions etc) and to this end, your views are required, through your State Representatives. Obviously, we cannot expect much inter state representation in Sydney so I intend to obtain input from State Representatives, in writing, beforehand, so that our consideration of matters includes as many views as possible.

On a sad note, you are probably aware of the death this year, of Colin Cooper, a 5RAR stalwart and long time member of our Association Committee. We extend our sympathy to his wife and children. Members of A Company, 5RAR second tour, would also be concerned to know that their Company Commander, Reg Sutton is now resident in a nursing home in Canberra from long-term illness.

In closing, I would like to congratulate, on your behalf, all members of 5 7 Battalion(mechanised) for

their highly successful operational tour of duty in Timor in 1999/2000. They did an outstanding job and many members were justly recognised. The Battalion is now reorganising and retraining, and we wish them well.

## WHAT'S NEW IN THE AUSTRALIAN ARMY

The Australian army has certainly gone through major changes since our time in Vietnam. Even some years after Vietnam, the army's equipment was not really upgraded to any great extent.

This is now changing. We have seen far better uniforms and upgrades of old equipment, the M113 is one example, the new Steyr 5.56 (for better or for worse) is another, and of course a vast improvement in webbing and packs - not before time.

Perhaps the best is yet to come, here are some examples:

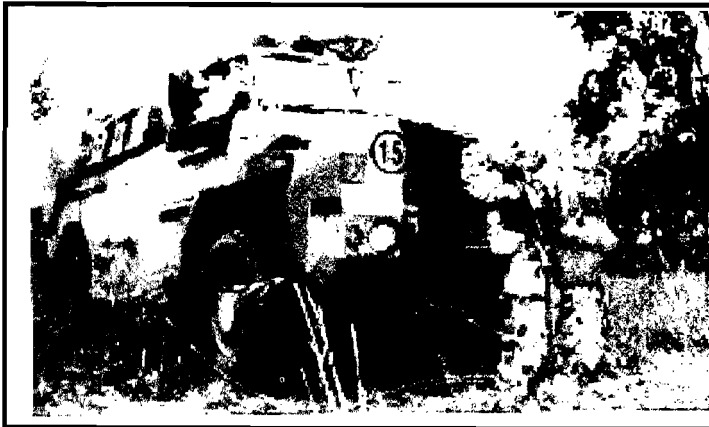
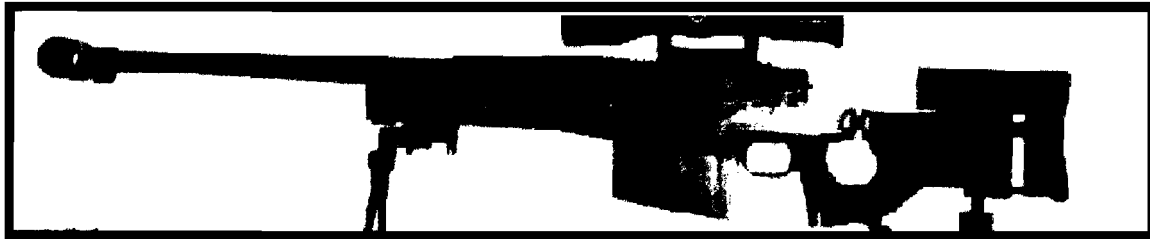
### 50 Cal Sniper Rifle

Three new rifles are undergoing trials to determine the best for the army - Robar, Accuracy International and Barrett Fire arms.

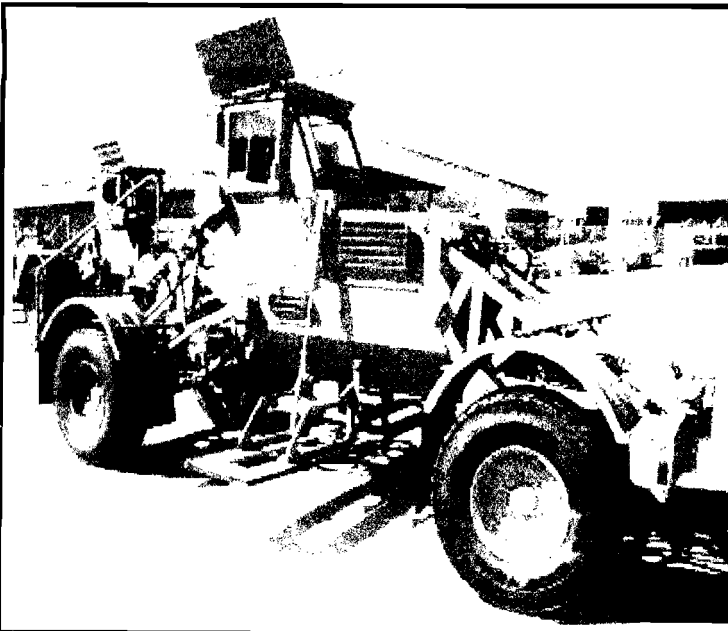
#### **ACCURACY INTERNATIONAL**

**50 CAL – RANGE 1500m –WEIGHT 13.64 kg – 5 rd MAGAZINE – BOLT ACTION**

Capable of engaging hard targets such as bunkers and light armoured vehicles at ranges to 1500m



**BUSHMASTER** – Designed to deliver troops to the action, fresh and in the best possible condition. Carries a 7.62 MG for range and extended firepower to support troops whilst dismounting. The vehicle has exceeded its specifications in terms of ballistic protection. This armoured-protected troop carrier if all goes well will be 'Scrub bashing' with our troops in due course.



**CHUBBY**-looks like a road grader don't you think? In fact it is a Mine detection and clearing system one vehicle detect mines and a follow on vehicle clears the route. How this is done I am not sure. However, all vehicles have 'V' shaped driver hulls to protect the drivers. The system comes in component form packed in shipping containers on roll out rails allowing quick deployment. Previously as we know, Engineers did mine clearance with hand held detectors. Two complete systems, one is in Darwin, the other in Townsville are state of the art mine clearing equipment now in the army.

**REPORT FROM 5/7 RAR****LATEST NEWS FROM BINH BA LINES**

The Tigers returned from post Timor leave in mid July to meet approximately 50 new members of the Battalion. The reinforcements were a welcome addition, as they provide the new energy and enthusiasm to complement the experience of those who had achieved so much in East Timor.

The focus on return was to restore the Battalion back to its high state of readiness. There were many aspects to this challenge. Firstly there was a pressing need to develop the leadership potential of the soldiers and so 40 privates returned early from leave to prepare for the Subject One Course. Under the watchful eye of the RSM and some selected SNCO, they all successfully completed the pre-course testing and then went on to receive all the awards for the course - including student of merit to Pte 'Dingo' Vincent. The Battalion also conducted a Regimental Signals, Basic Mortar and Mechanized Driver's course, whilst some of the recent reinforcements went down to Puckapunyal to attend an RAAC drivers course. Again, some excellent results were achieved.

With many officers away on career or mechanized courses, the training of the sections and platoons has rested with the NCOs, who have revelled in the opportunity. The Rifle Companies have spent considerable time shooting, with the culmination activity being Ex TIGER CHARGE Ph 1, conducted at the newly developed Kangaroo Flat Training Area. These purpose built ranges are outstanding and allowed the rifle sections to improve their instinctive and battle shooting. The second phase of the exercise will see the M113s deploy to Mt Bunday to conduct live firing, whilst the Mortar Platoon shoots fire plans for the Commanding Officer.

The Quartermaster and his platoon have spent considerable time in stocktaking the Battalion's equipment, to ensure what came back from Timor actually belong to us. This took considerable effort, especially when the bulk of our B vehicles and specialist equipment remained in country with 6 RAR. At the same time, the Workshop has been in full swing, with British Aerospace contractors and our own tradesmen restoring the Armoured vehicle and weapon fleets back to their former glory - next time we will take our own gear through the customs process!

The Adjutant has just returned from heading up a group of four Officers and nine Corporals on an exchange with the Coldstream Guards in Canada for eight weeks. This was a great experience for all concerned, with ample time for some quality adventure training and sight seeing. The opportunity to train with British infantry confirmed that our Battalions are in pretty good shape by anyone's comparison. Live firing at platoon level was another highlight for our diggers.

Pipes and Drums have been busy gathering new members and marching in a number of events including the Freedom of the City of Palmerston for 1<sup>st</sup> Brigade, the street parade for the Olympians and the initiation of our new mascot, Quintus Tertius from Crocodylus Park.

The Battalion has dominated a 'lack lustre' Brigade sporting competition on return, with Australian Rules, water polo, soccer and touch being pretty well unbeatable. In fact, the First XVIII (Tigers) ended up winning the Grand Final by defeating 1 Arm'd Regt by 112 points! What has been pleasing is our ability to field sides, despite the large number of people away on courses or exchange. On 18 October the Battalion dominated the Brigade Cross Country event and retained the trophy by a large margin.

The remainder of the year will see a trial of the new ruggedised Battlefield Command Support System (BCSS) computers by Bravo Company, training for the Deployable Battle Group under the Regimental Headquarters 1<sup>st</sup> Armoured Regiment and further mechanised, Subject One (in Watsonia, Vic) and sniper courses.

The Battalion will celebrate its 27<sup>th</sup> birthday from 30<sup>th</sup> November, with the Bradey Taylor Rugby Game, Church Parade, Family day and culminating on 3<sup>rd</sup> December with a Trooping of the Colour parade and Battalion Ball. Command will change from LTCOL Simon Gould to LTCOL Michael Tucker and the Tigers will be ready for the challenges that lay ahead in 2001. - LTCOL S. Gould.

## WAR DIARY

The rain was blinding and we just stood in it as navigation and communication between Bazza (Forward Scout) and Jack (Section Commander) was too difficult.

We continued on and some time later we hit a minefield, there was a track to the left and I noticed sticks floating on top of the water that were arrow shaped. We called the boss up and he confirmed what we already knew. He gave us the word to try and skirt around it for 100m then got back on our bearing. We did this until Bazza looked down beside his foot. There were three sticks standing upright and tied at the top, we didn't identify what sort of mine was there but instead back pedaled out trying to remember where we last put our foot down

We tried to skirt again but hadn't gone far when I noticed three trees on my left had the centre branch cut out, all trees were directly in line. We weren't sure if this was the minefield boundary. We finally did a big detour to get around it then we continued on our original bearing. At 6.30 we came across some high ground, it was dark so we harboured for the night and had a brew.

It rained again for the next 2 hours, so we rolled ourselves up in our hutchies and lay in the mud. We shivered all night with the cold. The piquet, because it was so dark stood or tripped on me all through the night, but between the mossies and piquets I managed a few hours sleep.

8 Platoon have found a bunker measuring 30 x 40 ft.

September 1969 16th

First up this morning I had to strip the machine gun completely and clean it of water and surface rust from yesterday, I also cleaned and oiled all my ammo (500 rounds). We moved out at 8 o'clock with two sections leading, our section bought up the Rear. At around midday the forward scout of two section Mick Browne, noticed a red Flag up in a tree.

The boss gave the signal for the platoon to harbor, while this was happening the Boss sent our section to reece up ahead, he said to be careful as there could be a VC Camp. We moved about 30 metres at a very slow and cautious pace. Our platoon was Making a lot of noise taking off those packs which was frustrating us as we were trying to listen.

Without warning Bazza our forward scout saw an enemy coming through the bush. There was no time to give the enemy signal, so Bazza put a aimed burst into him then yelled contact front. I started putting machine gun fire off to his right as I had a basic idea where the camp was.

Jack then called me up to his right but as I was racing forward I tripped on a vine and went splat into the mud, so I stayed there and continued firing at a shape I could see through the scrub (which turned out to be the enemy kitchen).

When I'd put through my first belt I yelled to Popeye to give me his belt, he threw it across to me but it landed in the mud. I didn't take much notice of that and quickly got Them into the feed cover and continued firing.

At this stage our section was in extended line with Bernie Cannon lobbing M79 rounds from behind us.

Two section had moved up on our right and were hooking in on that flank

After 60 rounds my gun suddenly jammed. It was so jammed I couldn't cock it by Hand so I stood up and started to kick the cocking handle. Jack was yelling to me to get down but I ignored him. I was too frustrated and pissed off to even care about my safety

After a number of kicks that operating group freed itself I then quickly stripped the back of the gun and checked the firing pin but it was okay, but all along I knew it was mud but I was hoping against hope that it wasn't. I tried to fire again but it jammed. I felt stuffed and exhausted, I was covered in mud and sweat.

The boss gave orders to get our section forward (he was doing a two section attack) Jack said the gun was stuffed and wouldn't move without a machine gun, so Jones came up with his gun

So while the contact progressed I went to the rear of the platoon to fix the weapon, there were two blokes there, our medic and batman who were covering the rear.

Once again I had to stand up and kick the cocking handle to release the operating group. I stripped the gun down, the chamber was jammed packed with mud and I had to do a major cleaning job under pressure. I also felt I'd let the blokes down.

It took me about 10 minutes to get it free, some time during this I'd badly cut my hand and was losing quite a bit of blood, so between clean oil and clean blood I got everything working okay.

I went racing back up to the section, but by this time the contact was over and the platoon had harboured and were searching for gear

We couldn't find any bodies even the one Bazza shot was dragged away, the enemy bugged out fast as they left behind packs, hats and Ho Chi Minh sandals, there were bras and panties hanging in the trees, so there were women as well.

The camp would have had 15-20 VC and there was a large bowl of rice cooked in the kitchen, which was just covered in jungle foliage

The boss then called Cobra Helicopter Gunships (Bushrangers) in to put in mini gun and rocket fire to our front, while this was going on we brewed up and had something to eat.

Alter the Cobras' had finished, we swept through the remainder of the camp shooting up the camp facilities. Once the sweep was finished, Jack told me to cover down a track so I put the gun down facing down the track and Popeye and I plonked ourselves down while more searching was carried out.

The boss came forward and looked at the track, he was concerned the VC didn't use the track in their escape. He went down the track about 20—30 yards and came back and casually said "you better get off the track mate it's mined!" So Popeye and I moved back off it hoping we didn't set off an explosion.

About 3 30 we moved to a clearing 200 yards away to our left and harboured, a Bell helicopter came with ammo and took back captured gear and documents plus Dave Nicholas who had a slight shrapnel wound. The chopper made a return trip to bring more ammo and took back Popeye who was sick with lice.

We then moved to a right harbor position, on the way there we came across a fresh crap pit (toilet) we did a slight detour of this as the light was fading and didn't want to get into another scrap with poor light. Once again the rain poured down and the area flooded, I found about 2 feet of raised dirt so put the gun there. Everyone laid in water all night, I put my head on top of the gun with the rest of the body in 6 inches of water. Somehow I slept, it had been a long day.
